Introduction

1. My name is Tim Williams.

2. I hold the qualifications and experience set out at paragraphs 2-3 of my statement

of evidence dated 4 July 2025.

3. I reconfirm that I have read and agree to comply with the Code of Conduct for

Expert Witnesses in the Environment Court Practice Note 2023.

**Key Points** 

4. Lake Hāwea South is ideally placed to provide for urban intensification in line with

the proposed variation. Specifically, as a greenfield area guided by a Structure

Plan a logical and planned approach to intensification can occur.

5. It is noted that the Longview Special Housing Area (SHA) already provides a

range of lot sizes from 202m<sup>2</sup> to 600m<sup>2</sup> with a large number between 250m<sup>2</sup> and

300m<sup>2</sup> so applying intensification provisions will complement the densities

already established in this area.

6. The greatest demand at Longview has been for 300m² lots and 30% of buyers at

Longview are first home buyers (FHB). These FHB almost exclusively buy 300m2

sites as they strike the perfect balance between affordability and usability. The

current zoning LDSR only enables lots down to 450m<sup>2</sup>. Enabling lot sizes of

300m<sup>2</sup> through UIV as notified will directly support first home buyers.

7. As noted in my evidence I support providing for a 14m height limit within the

LSCZ at Lake Hāwea South. The LSCZ in this location is well placed to provide

for intensification through additional height where it will support this location as

the focal point within Lake Hāwea South and the context can ensure an

appropriate transition to residential activities.
